**Inter-Club Challenge**  
**ANU SL2 v's Canberra City SL3**

The ANU State League 2 team certainly looks different these days. Gone is the hot-headed Spaniard and his team of hand picked prima donnas who promised so much but failed to deliver. In their place is a calculating and insightful Englishman and a group of odd-ball players with a diverse range of experiences and abilities. Overseeing his chargers the Englishman, who is known for his eternal optimism, was heard muttering "I think I can do something with this mob". Well wait and see.

The match against Canberra City was our second of the season but perhaps the first serious attempt to play a unique formation that we have been working on at training. Unlike the traditional 4-4-2 or 3-5-2 formations of the past, SL2 is revolutionising ANU football with a 4-2-2-1-1 formation. It seems our aim is to confuse the opposition and ourselves as much as possible.

### **The Game**
